The four high school seniors who received awards exemplify the standards of AAUW because they plan to continue their education at a college or university. They have also been good citizens and assets to their school and community. The honored seniors were Olivia R. Barney of Southern Huntingdon County High School, Rachael Denae Barszczowski of Juniata Valley High School, Leah Lashlee of the Huntingdon Area High School, and Karli Smith Mount Union Area High School.

Olivia Barney, the Southern Huntingdon High School representative, is the daughter of Donna Barney and lives in Orbisonia. Olivia has been a member of several clubs and societies: Spanish Club (vice-president senior year), Library Club, Daily News Press Club, Varsity Club, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Drama Club (participation in 4 school productions), Photography Club, Majorettes, Leo's Club, Courtyard Project, running club, Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA), National Honor Society and Student Council President. (senior year). She also served as the Class of 2017 vice-president, FBLA vice-president, Field Hockey treasurer, and Leo's Club president during her high school years.
